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that we were finally able to present our concert, featuring the monumental oratorio by the Black Canadian-born composer R. Nathaniel Dett, *The Ordering of Moses*, for a packed audience of over 1,100 people at The Riverside Church on June 17, 2022. This concert was delayed for two years due to the pandemic. We presented the concert in association with the Manhattan School of Music and the Harlem School of the Arts in honor of the Harlem Renaissance Centennial and Juneteenth.

This event garnered lots of attention and was covered by ABC Eyewitness News, WNYC News, *The Gothamist*, and OperaWire. It also got excellent reviews from *The New York Times* and *Seen and Heard International*. What was most insightful about the *The New York Times* review entitled "The Ordering of Moses' Shines at Riverside Church" is that it so precisely described what we aim to do in noting that "the event felt like a broad community gathering, as though a sampling of city dwellers stepped off a subway train and headed to the same place. New Yorkers across ages...filled the pews." The underlying theme of the program was one of hope, Black liberation, and a foreshadowing of our own trimphant emergence from the pandemic we are all enduring.

## 2021 - 2022 YEAR IN REVIEW

In July members of The Harlem Chamber Players joined Concert Theatre Works at Caramoor in a performance of *The Chevalier*, a musical play about the Chevalier de Saint-Georges, the first known classical composer of African descent. We hope to bring this production to Harlem in 2023.

Other highlights during the last year included The Harlem Chamber Players' Quartet being invited to perform for the readings during the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary 9/11 Commemoration, presenting the world premiere performance of Nkeiru Okoye's *We Met at the Symphony* that we commissioned, and presenting our inaugural "Women of the Movements" concert in partnership with The Forum at Columbia University.

We are also thrilled to have been awarded the 2022 Sam Miller Award for Performing Arts, given by the Lower





Manhattan Cultural Council this past spring. New York Community Trust featured founder Liz Player in its Spring Newsletter in an announcement about The Harlem Chamber Players receiving a grant award toward diversifying audiences for chamber music.

## 2022 - 2023 PREVIEW

ur new season opens on September 23, 2022 with two concerts featuring masterpieces in chamber music literature, including the Mendelssohn *Octet*, *Spiritual Fantasy No. 12* by Frederick Tillis, and *Quartettsatz* by Franz Schubert. On September 30<sup>th</sup> and October 1<sup>st</sup> you



will find The Harlem Chamber Players' Quartet performing at the Met Museum on Fifth Avenue right near the Petrie Court Café in the Carroll and Milton Petrie European Sculpture Court.

On October 8 we pay tribute to Latine/Hispanic Heritage Month with guest artists Sweet Plantain Quartet, internationally acclaimed saxophonist James Carter, and two-time Grammy-nominated violinist Curtist Stewart in music by Latine composers, including Gabriela Lena Frank, Eddie Venegas, and Roberto Sierra. The composer Roberto Sierra will be in attendance. On November 18, our Annual Bach Concert, which has been on pause for two years, returns with a concert of concerti, featuring violinists Ashley Horne and Claire Chan with orchestra comprising members of The Harlem Chamber Players.

On February 13, 2023 members of The Harlem Chamber Players, along with the Talea Ensemble, will be presented by the New York Philharmonic in their new Artist Spotlight Series in the Sidewalk Studio in David Geffen Hall for a performance of Julius Eastman's *Femenine*. We return on February 16, 2023 to the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture for our 15<sup>th</sup> Annual Black History Month Celebration with guest artist pianist-composer Aruán Ortiz in the world premiere of *Episodes of an Unforeseen Departure* for chamber ensemble, solo works for piano, and other chamber works by Black composers.
