# 2018 – 2019 YEAR IN REVIEW

fter an incredible 10th Anniversary Season, we used the last year to step back a bit and plan for our next L big season. We had a few memorable highlights. We were invited to join Harlem's power couple, jazz pianist Jason Moran and mezzo-soprano Alicia Hall Moran, in their Carnegie Hall production "Two Wings: The Music of Black America in Migration." An orchestra comprised of members of The Harlem Chamber Players, led by conductor Tania León, shared the stage with an amazing cast of artists of all genres, including jazz saxophonist James Carter, Harriet Tubman: The Band, Pastor Smokie Norful, the Grammy-nominated wind quintet Imani Winds, and tenor Lawrence Brownlee. Another highlight was our 11th Annual Black History

Month Celebration at the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture for which we drew another at-capacity crowd. This concert featured two world premieres by the renowned African American composer Adolphus Hailstork, including the concert aria Nobody Know commissioned by The Harlem Chamber Players to commemorate the 400th Anniversary of the importation of the first black slaves to America. We were also invited to join the Healing of the Nations Foundation in their sold-out 5th Annual Juneteenth Celebration at Carnegie Hall.

# 2019 - 2020 PREVIEW

e are excited about the upcoming season, which will be our most ambitious one to date. We will continue to present some of the most beautiful classics known in chamber music literature, and this year we will join Harlem in celebrating the Harlem Renaissance 100, the Centennial of the birth of the Harlem Renaissance. The goal of this celebration, led by the Harlem Cultural Collaborative, is to celebrate and empower the Harlem community.

We will present the monumental oratorio, The Ordering of Moses, by composer R. Nathaniel Dett, in partnership with the Cathedral Church of Saint John the Divine, as part of this celebration. We chose this masterpiece not only because of how great the music is but also because of its message of liberation, appropriate for the new awakening happening among many of






us during these politically fraught times. This season finale will feature the multi-genre IMG artist, conductor Damien Sneed; a 100-member choir, comprised of members of Le Chateau Chorale, as well as singers from other Harlem Arts organizations; a 50-piece orchestra comprised of members of The Harlem Chamber Players; organ; and four soloists. The confirmed soloists will be Met Opera soprano Brandie Sutton, alto Raehann Bryce-Davis, tenor Gregory Hopkins (of Harlem Opera Theater), and Met Opera baritone Justin Austin. Also on the program will be the world premiere arrangement of *Lift* Ev'ry Voice and Sing by Damien Sneed.

e are also pleased to announce that for this upcoming 2019 - 2020 season, The Harlem Chamber Players will be Artists-in-Residence at the Harlem School of the Arts. Leading this residency will be oboist Hassan Anderson, whom we recently named Director of Educational Programming. Mr. Anderson will also work closely with Amadi Azikiwe, our Community Engagement Director, in expanding our Newark area outreach programs. We will soon announce popup concerts and master classes we will present as part of this residency. Also new for this year is that we will make our debut at Harlem Stage in a new collaboration with Talea Ensemble on April 18, 2020 in a performance of the late African-American minimalist composer Julius Eastman's Femenine.

Our season will begin on Friday, September 27, 2019 with our Opening Concert at Broadway Presbyterian Church





This program will feature the Beethoven Sextet for two horns and strings, the Britten Phantasy Quartet, and the Tchaikovsky Souvenir de Florence. On Sunday, October 27, 2019 an Afternoon Chamber Music Concert at Goddard Riverside's Bernie Wohl Center will feature harpist Ashley Jackson, flutist Julietta Curenton, violist Amadi Azikiwe, and other members of The Harlem Chamber Players performing music by the Chevalier de Saint-Georges, Debussy, Miguel del Águila, and Schubert. The "Harlem Bach Project" continues on Friday, November 22, 2019 at Broadway Presbyterian Church with our Annual Bach Concert. This concert will feature Met Opera soprano Brandie Sutton and mezzo-soprano Lucia Bradford in selected arias. The program will also include the Brandenburg Concerto No. 4 and the Triple Violin Concerto.

Virtuoso pianist Joseph Joubert and his wife soprano Renay Peters Joubert will be featured guest artists for our February 13, 2020 12th Annual Black History Month Celebration at the Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture in a program celebrating the Harlem Renaissance Centennial. March 21, 2020 is the date of our next Annual Joint Concert with the sensational students of Opus 118 Harlem School of Music, and we are planning to also bring in an ensemble or two from the Harlem School of the Arts.
